But by the death of many former members or donors, the Association is weakened, and its resources are now insufficient to do all it could wish for the relief of some urgent cases of illness or distress, among the survivors of the war of 1830-31 (new very few, but all about 80 years of age); others of the insurrections of 1848 and 1863, and the Polish soldiers, who, taken prisoners by the English at Bomarsund in 1854, voluntarily entered our service during the Crimean war, notwithstanding that they would have been denied the rights of prisoners of war if re-captured by the Russians.
